- 3. There have been other famous speeches made by rulers or leaders, such as the speech made by Elizabeth 1 as the country faced the impending Spanish Armada in 1588, and the speech made by Sir Winston Churchill in June 1940. What words would you use to describe the impact that these speeches would have made on their listeners, or those who read the words later?
